alternately on the personalities and institutional decisions in new york and their effects on the jdc workers and their rescue efforts in europe he balances personal stories with a country by country account of the fate of jews through ought the war years the grim statistics of millions deported and killed are set in the context of the hopes and frustrations of the heroic individuals and small groups who actively worked to prevent the nazis final solution this study is essential reading for anyone who seeks to understand the american jewish response to european events from 1939 to 1945 bauer confronts the tremendous moral and historical questions arising from jdc s activities how great was the danger who should be saved first was it justified to use illegal or extralegal means what country would accept jewish refugees his analysis also raises an issue which perhaps can never be answered could american jews have done more if they had grasped the reality of the holocaust the author traces the roots of anti semitism that burgeoned through the ages and provides a comprehensive description of how and why the holocaust occurred examining jewish resistance in the holocaust dismisses the view that the jews went to their deaths like sheep to the slaughter in the early stages of the holocaust resistance was passive mainly a struggle for physical survival in the ghettos in later stages jews took to armed resistance uprisings in ghettos partisan warfare etc dwells on the role of the judenräte in the struggle for survival and the dilemmas with which jewish leaders were confronted a revised version of two courses of lectures delivered as part of the broadcast university series of israel army radio discusses the struggle of jews for survival under nazi rule and attempts at aid and rescue by jews in the western democracies and palestine by foreign governments and by righteous gentiles emphasizes that the nazis decided to murder all the jews only in autumn 1940 until then no one could have foreseen the holocaust to come when the first reports of mass murder were received they met with disbelief on the part of most jews as well as non jews this lack of awareness explains why the potential victims were slow to escape or resist and in conjunction with the prevalence of antisemitism and the political impotence of world and palestinian jewry it also explains the failure of the outside world to come to their rescue among the topics covered are the search for countries of asylum the transfer agreement illegal immigration to palestine the ghettos at the avraham harman institute of contemporary jewry at the hebrew university of jerusalem and was a visiting professor at brandeis university yale university richard stockton college and clark university he is honorary chair of ihra international holocaust remembrance alliance with its 35 member governments member of the israel academy of sciences and academic adviser to yad vashem in 1998 he was awarded the israel prize and in 2016 the emet prize the highest academic award given by israel for the last fifty years i have been studying the genocide of the jews which we call the holocaust for the last thirty years i have been studying antisemitism and for the last fifteen years genocide generally and ways to prevent it that is the prism through which i view jewish history past and present i prefer to look at it from a contemporary point of view that is also the way i view human history in general it is quite possible that this view from the present to the past is decisively influenced by the fact that my professional life is determined by the most tragic and serious issues that any historian and most certainly a jewish one can deal with the holocaust antisemitism and there were not enough funds for the jews to buy their way out there was no welcome for them abroad and there was too little time before war began bauer then concentrates on the negotiations that took place between 1942 and 1945 as himmler tried to keep open options for a separate peace with the western powers in fascinating detail bauer portrays the dramatic intrigues that took place a group of jewish leaders bribed a nazi official to stop the deportation of slovakian jews a czech jew known as dogwood tried to create an alliance between american leaders and conservative german anti nazis adolf eichmann s famous trucks for blood proposal to exchange one million jews for trucks to use against the soviets failed because of western reluctance and much more tormenting questions arise throughout bauer s discussion if the nazis were actually willing to surrender more jews should the allies have acted on the offer did the efforts to exchange lives for money constitute collaboration with the enemy or heroism in answering these questions bauer s book engrossing profound and deeply moving adds a new dimension to holocaust studies out of the ashes is a unique account of the torn as under by war by january 1943 everyone in warsaw knew that the deportations of the ghetto residents meant the death of the ghetto inhabitants after yurek s older sister was deported yurek attempted to find a hiding place for himself and his younger sister hannah while his mother golda remained at home to earn money in order to pay the polish family who hid her two children with the power of description that only actual experience can endow yehuda elberg relates the birth death and resurrection of a dynasty a selection of some of israels finest writers in this remarkable never before told account of the ovitz family seven of whose ten members were dwarves readers bear witness to the best and worst of humanity and to the terrible irony of the ovitz s fate being burdened with dwarfism helped them endure the holocaust israeli authors yehuda koren and eilat negev weave the tale of a beloved and successful family of performers who were famous entertainers in central europe until the nazis deported them to auschwitz in may 1944 descending into the hell of the concentration camp from the transport train the ovitz family known widely as the lilliput troupe was separated experiments upon the ovitz s and the creepy fondness he developed for these small people even the songs he composed and sang to this family of singers dancers and klezmorim finally liberated by russian troops the family returned to their deserted village in transylvania and eventually found their way to a new home in israel they resumed their careers overcame their handicaps and became wealthy and successful performers the story of six years in the life of a polish jewish boy who along with his mother and sister survived world war ii through cunning and guile chronicles yehuda nir s harrowing flight from occupied poland in 1941 during which he was forced to don an aryan disquise to elude capture a collection of working papers and addresses discussed at the international
